Infant Child's Mission Statement:

The Nature of Prayer and Liturgy

We believe that Christian prayer and liturgy in a Catholic school names and celebrates God's presence in our lives. It is concerned with giving glory, honour, praise and thanks to God. It is our loving response, in word and action, to God's invitation to enter into relationship, made possible through the work of Jesus Christ and the witness of the Holy Spirit.

Legal Requirements

We acknowledge the legal requirement that there must be a daily act of worship for all pupils. (This can take place at any time during the school day and can be either a single act of worship for all pupils, or separate acts of worship in school groups.) We understand that simply holding an assembly that includes a prayer, said either by the teacher or everyone present, does not fulfil this requirement. We also acknowledge that Prayer and Liturgy and assembly are distinct activities. They may sometimes



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form part of the same gathering, but the difference between the two will always be made clear.

The 'act of worship' is not designated curriculum time under regulations and will not be subsumed under any part of the curriculum, including Religious Education.

The school's provision for prayer and liturgy will fulfil pupils' entitlement to experience the range of liturgical treasures of the Church, including a shared repertoire of prayers and liturgical music with which pupils in the school will be familiar.

As a rule, Prayer and Liturgy will take place on the school premises. However, the Governing Body has the discretion to allow acts of worship to be held elsewhere e.g. church, church grounds.

"To ensure that the Lord Jesus Christ is at the centre of a Catholic school, prayer and liturgy must be at the heart of its community life. They are essential to the school's Catholic life and mission" ("To know You more clearly' The Religious Education Directory).

Responsibility

(a) Governance

The governors, as guardians of the Catholic school's life and mission, have a responsibility to ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- there is a named person(s) who is responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school
- the prayer and liturgy policy is updated regularly and shared with all stakeholders
- there is a budget for prayer and liturgy that reflects its centrality to the life of a Catholic school.

(b) Headteacher

The Headteacher, as the spiritual leader of the school as a Catholic community, ensures that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the



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guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory

- they work in partnership with the leader(s) for prayer and liturgy
- those responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school have been given appropriate training and formation to ensure that all guidance is followed and adhered to
- there are suitable resources for prayer and liturgy in the school.

(c) Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator

Those responsible for prayer and liturgy ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- there is an Annual Plan of Provision for prayer and liturgy across the school year which identifies liturgical seasons and key celebrations, as well as opportunities for the celebration of the Sacraments
- there is daily planned prayer for all pupils, appropriate to age and ability, as outlined in the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- pupils are supported in their liturgical formation to take an active role in the planning, preparation, and delivery of prayer and liturgy according to their age and capacity, and in a manner which facilitates their progressive participation
- resources to support the planning of prayer and liturgy are appropriate and readily available to staff and pupils
- induction on prayer and liturgy takes place for new members of staff, as required staff have access to effective training and formation opportunities
- monitoring and evaluation of prayer and liturgy take place regularly and feed back into planning for future liturgies
- monitoring of prayer and liturgy is reported to the Headteacher and governing body to support whole-school development and the Catholic life of the school
- there is collaboration with local clergy and parishes
- liaison with the Diocesan Advisory Service and others is maintained to ensure they keep



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updated with best practice.

The Place of Prayer and Liturgy in the Life of our School

We endorse the belief that Prayer and Liturgy takes into account the religious and educational needs of all who share in it:

- those who form part of the worshipping community in church
- those for whom school may be their first and only experience of church
- those from other Christian traditions – or none
- those from other faith backgrounds.

It will be an educational activity or experience to which all can contribute and from which all can gain. Worship in this school is more than just a legal requirement. It is an integral part of school life and central to the Catholic tradition.

To support the development of Prayer and Liturgy at home, we send home weekly Prayer Bags, which relate to Liturgical seasons and are differentiated for year groups. Every Wednesday, each family are given a Wednesday Word newsletter which carries the Sunday Gospel into school family homes. This creates a new opportunity for the Word to be present in the homes of our school families.

The Aims of Prayer and Liturgy

We believe that Prayer and Liturgy in our school aims to provide opportunity for all pupils and staff:

- to contemplate something of the mystery of God
- to reflect on spiritual and moral issues
- to explore their own beliefs
- to respond to and celebrate life



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- to experience a sense of belonging and develop community spirit
- to develop a common ethos and shared values
- to enrich religious experience
- to grow in liturgical understanding and development
- to reinforce prayers which are part of the Catholic tradition
- to reinforce positive attitudes
- to participate fully
- to take time out to ‘wonder at’, ‘to come to terms with’ and ‘to give worth to.’

Principles

All Prayer and Liturgy in this school will:

- raise our minds and hearts to God
- celebrate the presence of God in our life and school community
- be a high quality activity, fundamental to the life of the school and its Catholic character
- support learners’ spiritual development
- give learners positive liturgical experiences, appropriate to their age, aptitude and family backgrounds. In order to do this, celebrations will:
 - be kept small wherever possible or appropriate to help to personalise the experience;
 - be short and appropriately paced;
 - be simple, including a range of experiences offered in a variety of groupings and in a variety of settings, including outdoors;
 - seek to involve learners at all times in preparation and leadership.



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Organisation

Prayer and Liturgy always follows the liturgical seasons (appendix 1). Other times of prayer and worship in the school year include:

- Mass to celebrate the beginning of the school year
- A weekly Mass which one class attends on a rolling timetable at our local parish, St John the Baptist Church
- Celebration of Feast Days – Mass in the Church or our local senior school Chapel for Holy Days of Obligation. Appropriate liturgies for other feast days
- Christmas and Easter Prayer Services – for the whole school
- Mass to pray especially for the Year 6 leavers.



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The Planning, Content and Delivery of Prayer and Liturgy

Prayer and Liturgy is planned:

- Following a structure with reference to the Church's seasons, 'The Way, The Truth & The Life', significant dates and the curriculum. Scripture will be the focus in most acts of Prayer and Liturgy and we place utmost importance on our response to God's message.
- Involving consultation with appropriate parties and reference to school aims and policies.
- With flexibility to respond to changing situations within the school and the wider community
- To develop in pupils' skills that enable them to prepare, organise and lead worship rather than always participating or contributing in a token way.

The format for collective worship for our school is (appendix 2):

- **Gather** – how we come together, the setting, the environment (quiet gathering PowerPoint presentation, reflective music, lighted candles, icons etc.);
- **Listen/ Proclaim The Word** – every liturgy will centre around at least one text from the Bible, with the reading of the day being the first source. The Word of God will be proclaimed from a Bible.
- **Respond** – The response to the Word may lead into a time of ritual action or communal prayer. The ritual action may vary (dance, music, drama, art, poetry etc.) We place our needs before God (intercessory prayers);
- **Go Forth** – Giving the children something to hold on to from the experience of the liturgy that they can take into their daily lives

Recording

Prayer and Liturgy can be recorded:

- on a liturgy planner to keep note of themes, leaders, learner groupings and resources
- through displays, on the school website, class books, collections of learners' contributions, prayers, reflections, photographs, videos etc.
- Laleham Lea Prayer Tree in our Long Room displays children's prayers and intercessions



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Resourcing

Prayer and liturgy are central to the school's understanding of itself as a Catholic school, and this is reflected in the annual budget allocation and available resources, including staff time, chaplaincy provision, and dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy. The Catholic character of the school is reflected in religious artefacts and images on display throughout the building. Dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy will be furnished and maintained as such, and updated to reflect the Church's liturgical season. Staff training and formation costs will be funded separately to ensure that all staff are able to fulfil their responsibility to contribute to the prayer and liturgical life of the school.

Training and formation

All new staff will be supported during induction and beyond, so that they fully understand the responsibility they carry within their individual role for leading prayer and liturgy in the school. Any individual training needs will be identified and addressed through training and formation. There will also be the opportunity for whole-staff professional development at least once a year, so that all staff understand the importance of prayer and liturgy and relevant staff are well supported to lead as required.

Monitoring and Evaluation

Throughout the school year, the school's provision of worship will be evaluated to consider whether it meets the needs of all learners and whether learners are making progress in acquiring skills and abilities in organising and leading worship. Areas for development will be identified and issues raised will be actioned and evidenced as appropriate. This is monitored by the RE subject leader and the Senior Leadership Team.

Eucharist

Eucharistic celebrations in school will highlight a special occasion and will normally be celebrated with children whose faith development has reached an appropriate stage. The same general principles will apply to planning a Eucharistic celebration as other acts of school Prayer and Liturgy, therefore



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opportunities for children to participate will be maximised. When preparing these celebrations reference will be made to school guidance.

Children who have completed their First Holy Communion are welcomed to receive the Eucharist at Mass. Those children who have not made their First Holy Communion receive a blessing from the priest.

We believe that children are best introduced to prayer, the sacraments and particularly the Eucharist in a step by step approach.

At **Key Stage 1** Prayer and Liturgy includes:

- short, simple liturgies with ritual and variety
- occasional liturgies reflecting the Introductory rites in the Mass and/or The Liturgy of the Word
- whole school / Key Stage Mass.

At **Key Stage 2** Prayer and Liturgy includes:

- more advanced with ritual and variety
- occasional liturgies reflecting more aspects of the Mass
- whole school, class and year group Mass.



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School Statement on Prayer and Liturgy

Laleham Lea School

It is the responsibility of every Catholic school to provide for all its members a vital experience of liturgy, worship and prayer which:

- names and celebrates God present and active in authentic human experience
- is educative
- is within our Catholic tradition

The purpose of these experiences is:

- to raise our mind and heart to God
- to develop the school as a community of faith
- to assist learners in developing their relationship with God, creation and the community of the Church
- to witness to the community and the wider world

Prayer and Liturgy in our school will be:

- properly planned
- adequately resourced
- recorded
- monitored
- evaluated

in order to ensure that the Prayer and Liturgy experienced within the school is a relevant, meaningful and positive contribution to the religious, spiritual and moral development of all members of the community.

Policy Monitoring and Review

This policy is monitored by the Prayer and Liturgy Co-ordinator and is evaluated and reviewed by the whole school staff and governors every two years.

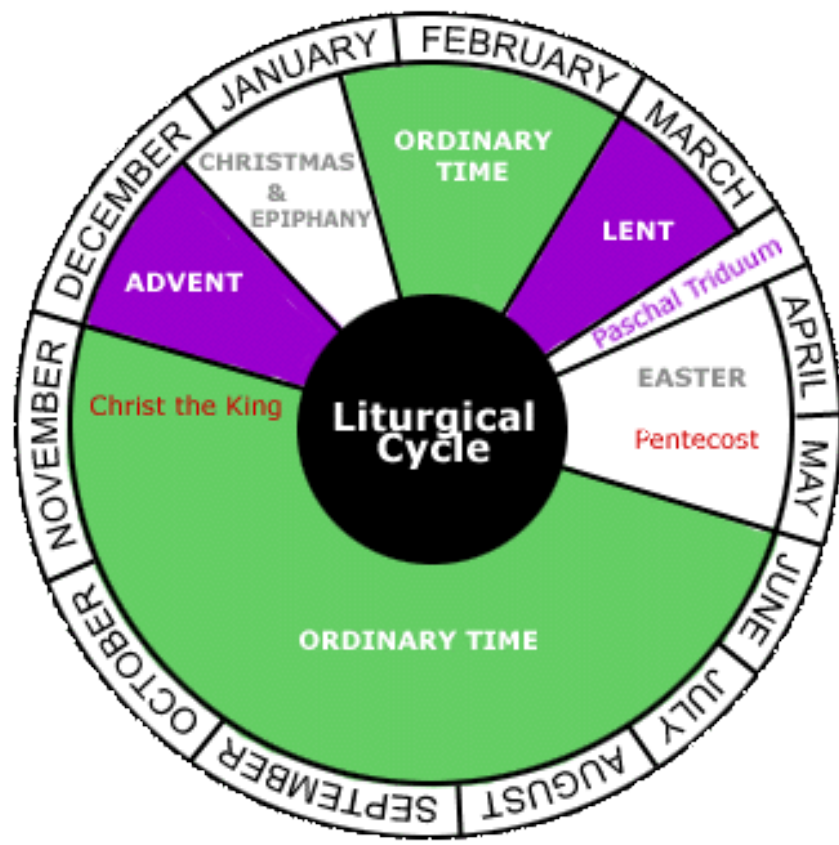


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Appendix 1 - Liturgies and Masses



The school will celebrate a start of year Mass and any Holy Days of Obligation that fall in term time with a whole-school Mass where possible, which is pre-organised by the RE Leader, the management team and Parish Priest (if available).

At the start of each academic year, dates will be discussed and classes allocated the responsibility of organising specific Masses or liturgies throughout the year. This will be done in consultation with the Parish Priest, the Headteacher and the RE coordinator.

Masses and liturgies can take place within the John Fisher Chapel or the School Hall where all children may participate from Reception to Year 6. Some Masses can take place at the local parish church.



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Appendix 2 - Collective Worship Format

Preparation	When, where, who, what? What resources will I need? Create focus. Send invitations.
Gathering	How will we begin / enter – to music? Create an atmosphere of prayer. Use a ‘gathering chant’, come in procession.
Listening	Reading from scriptures. Pause at times for quiet contemplation. Dramatise the readings / Use power point?
Responding	What do participants do? Quiet reflection, formal / informal prayer / respond to bidding prayers. Place stone at foot of cross etc.
Go Forth	What will I do to help those present take the message away with them – prayer card, picture, common prayer, action etc.
